THE ART OF SCIENCE

The annual presentation ceremony for the John Lambert Art Collection and the Mary Besley Memorial Award for Excellence in Biology was held at the Office of the Board of Studies on 25 July.

Each year the Board hosts an official function to present the Mary Besley Memorial Award to the student who comes first in the HSC Biology exam and to congratulate the students whose artworks are purchased for inclusion in the John Lambert Art Collection.

The President of the Board of Studies, Sam Weller, presented the students with certificates at the ceremony, which was attended by the students' parents, former principals and teachers, and Board Inspectors.

The John Lambert Art Collection began in 1990 under former President of the Board of Studies, John Lambert. The collection reflects some of the finest examples of works produced for the HSC by Visual Arts students, and is on permanent display at the Office of the Board of Studies.

Update on English K-6


Board endorsement for draft documents

A special meeting of the Board of Studies was held in the school holiday period to consider draft documents developed for the revision of the 1994 *English K-6 Syllabus and Support Document*. The Board endorsed three completed draft documents for consultation:

- the draft *English K-6 Syllabus*,
- *English K-6 Modules*; and
- *English K-6 Student Work Samples: Writing*.

Copies will be distributed to schools later this term.

Additional materials developed to support the draft syllabus will be made available during the consultation period. These materials include student work samples for reading, talking and listening; additional modules of work; parent support material; and a syllabus guide for principals.

President's Message



I had hoped this edition of Board Bulletin would be able to present the major decisions from the HSC White Paper. While many teachers are waiting anxiously for these decisions, it should be realised that the greatest possible care must be, and is being, taken to determine an educational blueprint that will take us successfully into the next century.

In the meantime, considerable work is continuing at both primary and secondary levels. By now schools will have received the long-awaited HSIE K-6 Writing Brief. Schools have until 15 September to consider this document as the basis on which the syllabus will be developed.

There are many issues to consider, including whether primary teachers support the concept of making some subject matter compulsory while at the same time having access to optional topics. Teacher reaction to the strong emphasis on Citizenship Education will also be most interesting.

At a recent special meeting the Board endorsed the Draft English K-6 Syllabus, an exciting document that already has received some positive comment. Teachers will be pleased to note the reduced number of outcomes, the absence of jargon and the accessibility of the document. All schools will receive copies of the syllabus in the near future, together with modules of suggested teaching strategies and samples of student writing, which have been annotated to illustrate the achievement of syllabus outcomes.

The development of a second booklet on assessing and reporting is progressing satisfactorily. There is no doubt that teachers are demanding practical solutions to the challenge of assessing outcomes and reporting achievements effectively. This has been a central issue facing all of us since outcomes became a focus of educational attention in the early 1990s. With the assistance of schools, we hope to deliver a useful document in Term 4 this year.

Primary Matters

National Benchmarks

Curriculum Branch officers have provided continuing advice to the Curriculum Corporation on the development of material for the National Benchmarking Project.

The National Benchmarking Project is an initiative of the Federal Government agreed to by the states and territories. The current objective of this project is to develop descriptions of student performance in literacy and numeracy in Years 3 and 5. This material will be used by states to collect data to compare student achievement across Australia.

The clear principle that is being reinforced by Board officers is that the material developed for the benchmarks must be compatible with syllabus content and outcomes in New South Wales. The Board will continue to provide advice to the Curriculum Corporation on the quality and relevance to New South Wales of draft material.

Creative Arts — trialling of units of work

Trialling teams have been providing responses to the syllabus writers on draft units of work developed to support the draft Creative Arts K–6 syllabus. The writing of units as well as the collection of work samples in Visual Arts, Music, Drama and Dance are proceeding well.

Teachers who have had very little experience in teaching Visual Arts said they found the units of work, which present sequences of learning experiences, rewarding and informative. They were particularly surprised with the quality of work their students produced and believe this is because the students have been exposed to the work of other artists. The units have provided the teachers with a structured series of lessons and students have been able to develop both their works and understanding over several weeks to arrive at a final piece of work.

Consultation on the draft Creative Arts K–6 syllabus is scheduled to take place in the latter half of 1998.

Mathematics

Careful analysis of the survey returns from schools on the Mathematics K–6 outcomes is now taking place. A working party of the Board's Mathematics K–6 Syllabus Advisory Committee has been formed to consider quantitative and qualitative data obtained from the surveys so that changes to the draft outcomes can be made.

The collection of student work samples, which is currently taking place in 25 New South Wales primary schools, will also assist in making amendments to the draft outcomes. The teachers and members of the working party will be able to use these examples of mathematics learning — the real work of students — as well as findings from the consultation to arrive at a final set of outcomes. The student work samples for Mathematics K–6 will be used to illustrate the achievement of the outcomes. They will accompany the outcomes in an addendum to the syllabus expected to be completed by the end of this year.

'Each of the four artworks displays a sound understanding of artmaking practice, reflecting the very high quality of Visual Arts education in NSW,' Mr Weller said at the presentation ceremony.

Former Riverstone High School student Luke Plummer's series of photographs, *Does the Divine Have a Form?*, appropriates 15th century imagery by manipulating famous artworks and placing them on the surface of bodies. His works play on other artists' works and the way other artists have approached artmaking.

Gregory Phillips of St Patrick's College, Strathfield, created a series of computer-generated works using computer scanning and editing equipment. *Super turbo icons for the art market* explores the concept of artist as marketer, icon and superstar.

Jessica Shirvington's artwork, *The Watchers*, is a series of three silk-screen prints. A former student of Loreto Normanhurst, Jessica's works have a strong juxtaposition of images and her sophisticated use of symbols makes reference to other times and places.

Loredana Petrella's acrylic and mixed media painting, *I'm sorry Imelda Marcos*, is a sumptuous, sensuous look at shoes. Loredana attended St Vincent's College, Potts Point.


As has been the practice in the past, works selected for the John Lambert Art Collection are chosen from the entire range of HSC artworks, not just those exhibited in ARTEXPRESS.

Jane Cass, a former student of James Ruse Agricultural High School, was presented with the Mary Besley Memorial Award for Excellence in Biology, having topped the subject in the 1996 HSC.

Jane is continuing in the field of science, studying medicine at the University of NSW.

The award was established in memory of Dr Mary Besley, who died in 1994. Mary Besley was a senior lecturer in Biology at the University of Sydney for most of her career as a science educator. She was also actively involved in the Leaving Certificate and HSC marking for more than 30 years, before retiring from marking in 1993.

Her sudden death in 1994 was a great loss to her colleagues at the marking centres. In 1994 the Biology marking group, which represents the many markers who have participated in marking over the years, established an award to perpetuate her memory.

The Board of Studies contributed to the collection and holds the funds in a trust account, which will provide an annual award of \$200 and a certificate to the top HSC Biology student for each year from 1994 to 1998. 

MULTILINGUAL INFORMATION FOR PARENTS ON THE HSC, SC AND K-6




Three new booklets that provide information in seven different languages for parents and students on the Higher School Certificate, the School Certificate and primary schooling are being sent to schools this month.

Produced by the Board of Studies, each booklet contains information in Arabic, Chinese, Greek, Korean, Spanish, Vietnamese and English, which schools can photocopy and send home to parents.

The booklet on the HSC explains exactly what the HSC is, the requirements students must meet, a brief overview of courses and subjects, and an explanation of the Tertiary Entrance Rank.

The School Certificate booklet explains how the Reference Tests determine the quota of grades each school receives, the requirements for the awarding of a School Certificate and a description of the documents students receive.

What will my child learn in primary school? lists the Key Learning Areas, providing parents with an outline of the subjects students will study from Kindergarten to Year 6. The booklet also advises parents of the role of the Board of Studies in developing curriculum and informing parents about what their children are learning.

'The Board wants all parents to be well informed about what their children are learning at school and these new booklets are just one of the ways we can help with that,' Sam Weller, President of the Board of Studies, said.

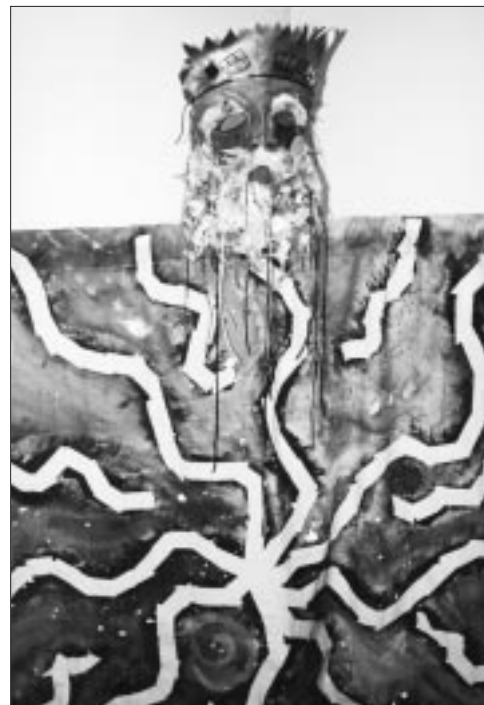

Students get smart about art

Talented Visual Arts students from schools in Sydney's south-west spent three days honing their skills at ArtSmart, an annual art camp organised by the South West Visual Arts Network. Three of the works are currently on display at the Office of the Board of Studies.

Held at Casula Powerhouse in May this year, the camp targets students who show a keen interest in art, and gives them the opportunity to develop their understanding and skills by taking part in a three-day workshop.

Sheree Dietrich, organiser of the camp and a Visual Arts teacher at Eagle Vale High School, said ArtSmart allows students to 'immerse themselves in their art, working further in the processes they are learning at school'.

The theme for this year was *Reflections* and the works on exhibit at the Board reflect both personal and cultural interpretations of the theme. 

Students were able to choose from three different workshops — ceramics, moulded leather and painted fabric, or wire and recycled materials — and were encouraged to work on projects they couldn't normally do at school, such as large-scale works.

The camp finished with an exhibition of all the students' artworks, giving them the opportunity to observe first-hand the responses of people to their work.
