

Summary of Classical Greek Extension HSC examination specifications and assessment requirements from 2010

In December 2008, the Board of Studies approved changes to the examination specifications and assessment requirements for a number of courses. The HSC examination specifications and assessment requirements for Classical Greek Extension are outlined below.

Outline of HSC examination specifications

A written examination of one hour and 50 minutes plus 10 minutes reading time.

Changes from current examination specifications

In Section I, there will be no choice in the extended response questions. The expected length for the response to the 10-mark question is included as a guide. It is presented as the approximate number of examination writing booklet pages (based on average-sized handwriting), and/or an approximate number of words. Students will not be penalised for responses of excess length: they may write less than or more than what is expected, and their responses will be marked on their merits.

There is an increase of 5 marks in questions related to unseen texts (Section II), with a corresponding reduction of 5 marks in Section I. In Section II there will be a compulsory translation of Homeric Greek text into English, as well as short-answer questions related to the text, in addition to the current choice of translation from Homeric Greek to English or the composition of a Classical Greek text from English.

Outline of internal assessment requirements

There will be two to three assessment tasks. There are no changes to the components and weightings.
