Today, Aboriginal artwork is sold around the world for large sums of money, the price payings down with the price being over \$2,000 on some pieces of out. Behind every Abanquah form of Aboriginal artwork, there is a story to be told. this allows indigenous people to Share their stones, ex it is apart of their identity and often pountings that are based on dreamtime steries have been passed down from generation to generation, becoming apourt of their heritage. It also allows for their relatives in the future, such as children, great Grandchildren and great-great grandchildren etc to lock broker at those pieces of out knowing their relative has painted them, and pass down the stones, contributing to the future generations haritage and identity.

In last the Indigenous community of Nouro often has Abenginal out galleries in the area, with pieces of artwork up for sale.

Thesees are popular events, with the artists often coming in and tailing about their artwerk and the story behind it.

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
