Question 5 (a)

Sample answer:

The program is called 'You can do that' and Mrs Panossian is a good example of how it's never too late to follow your dreams. Mrs Panossian went to university when she was older (55) and has become a teacher and psychologist.

Question 5 (b)

Sample answer:

• The radio program is 'you can do that'. The interview is effective because Mrs Panossian is initially reluctant to speak about her achievements and thought that her work is no big deal! By praising her and encouraging her to speak the interviewer gets her to open up and talk freely about her achievements. The program is targeted to young mothers in particular and both interviewer and interviewee directly target this group and encourage them to believe that they can do whatever they want!

Question 7 (b)

Sample answer:

The reasons for the change in thinking by David is his realisation that to become a lawyer he needs to attain a university degree as this will allow him to:

- (4) Have his own law practice
- (5) Earn substantially more
- (6) Bring status and pride to his parents and himself

Question 8 (a)

Sample answer:

"Our Traditions Threatened!"

According to Mr. Hovanissian Armenian traditions define Armenian identity, and the disappearance of these traditions will lead to the assimilations of Armenians into more populous nations.

Question 8 (b)

Sample answer:

The concern is the loss of identity as Armenians with the loss of traditions.

This is "unusual and unique" because for many centuries Armenians have remained true to their traditions. Only in the past 20 years (very short time) they have adopted without consideration the values and traditions of the West which now threatens the maintenance of Armenian identity.

Question 8 (c)

Sample answer:

Agrees with Mr Hovanissian

- New profile of Armenians emerging
- Adoption of local customs and lifestyles
- Loss of traditions and customs
- "Being Armenian in spirit and having a surname ending in ...ian" is sufficient to identify one as Armenian

Disagree with Mr Hovanissian

- New profile of Armenians is emerging
- Adoption of local customs and lifestyle ok for Armenian identity
- All traditions maintained



Question 9 (a)

Sample answer:

Mary is depressed and wants to share her feelings with her 'best friend'. She feels isolated at university. Her parents are not very helpful.

Question 9 (b)

Sample answer:

Advice

- Get over it!
- Look around you and count your blessings!
- You are lucky and many in Armenia would be envious
- Enjoy the warm sunny weather in Australia remember the long cold winters in Armenia
- Appreciate your family being with you
- You have a choice Australia or Armenia (I don't have that choice)
- Finish your studies, work hard and save a sizeable amount and then you can move to Armenia and live there if you wish

Question 9 (c)

Sample answer:

Mary is shallow – (forgets her 'best old friend')

- She is depressed and keeps looking at Armenia with 'rose coloured glasses' 'Armenia was magical'
- She is unable to appreciate the positives
 - Australia and all it offers
 - Her family
 - Her freedom of choice
 - Australia's beautiful weather
 - Her opportunity to study and earn good money
- She is a 'poor communicator'.
