

2010 HSC French Beginners Sample Answers

This document contains 'sample answers', or, in the case of some questions, 'answers could include'. These are developed by the examination committee for two purposes. The committee does this:

- (a) as part of the development of the examination paper to ensure the questions will effectively assess students' knowledge and skills, and
- (b) in order to provide some advice to the Supervisor of Marking about the nature and scope of the responses expected of students.

The 'sample answers' or similar advice are not intended to be exemplary or even complete answers or responses. As they are part of the examination committee's 'working document', they may contain typographical errors, omissions, or only some of the possible correct answers.

Question 14 (a)

Sample answer:

It is practised in 23 countries. In Japan, there are 2 million athletes, with as many women as men. In Australia there is only one man for every five hundred twirlers.

Question 14 (b)

Sample answer:

It is a sport using a baton. It is a mixture of gymnastics, acrobatics and dance. It is choreographed to music, which can be chosen or imposed. It can be an individual or team sport.

Question 15 (a)

Sample answer:

It is based on the real-life classroom experience of a French teacher. He teaches a class of disadvantaged pupils from diverse ethnic backgrounds. It is interesting as the director plays the role of the teacher and the students play the roles of their classmates.

Question 15 (b)

Sample answer:

Madame Ledoux is critical of the teacher spending too much time talking to the students instead of teaching them. He uses mockery and the same language to try and be their friend. Monsieur Gilbert, on the other hand, thinks it reflects the reality in the classroom eg rudeness of students and weaknesses of teachers. He also believes that the director successfully filmed the open conversation between the teacher and the students.
