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The quote "We love the things we love for what they are." by Robert Frost, shows the desire to express the innate qualities of the things we appreciate. As for Douglas Stewart, he expresses his love of nature and values of Australians by composing poems, while Bruce Woodley and Dobe Newton express it by composing a song. Their work includes the visions of Australia which are human connection with nature, the appreciation of nature and landscape, and Australian values. The main point of constructing these visions is to allow the responders to understand the different characteristics of Australian nature and also the values practised by the Australian society.

First of all, Douglas Stewart, Bruce Woodley, and Dobe Newton illustrate an Australian vision by showing the human connection with nature. In the poem "Nesting Time", Stewart illustrates the connection between a man and a creature of nature. The personification 'must decide' refers to the bird to make a choice of taking a risk by picking hair from the girl's head. The adjective 'brave wild creature' shows the bird ~~is~~ has the courage to land on the girl's head. By observing every action of the bird through its courageous nature, the poet learns the value of bravery. Stewart shows a strong relationship between mankind and nature, by illustrating the valuable lessons that nature can teach us. In the song "I Am Australian", Woodley and Newton illustrates human connection to nature. The noun 'mother lode' refers to the minerals the Australians mined to provide the basic needs for them. The active verbs 'endured the lash' shows the early settlers faced hardship and 'waited for the rain' shows the early settlers depended on nature to survive. Nature

contributes the basic needs for humans to ~~safely~~ survive and thus the composers <sup>are</sup> able to convey the vision to the responders. Hence, the Australian vision of human connection with nature is successfully communicated <sup>to</sup> ~~with~~ the responders.

Secondly, Stewart, Woodley, and Newton show an Australian vision by illustrating the appreciation of nature and landscape. In the poem "The Snow-Gum", Stewart relates to nature by describing the beauty of a snow-gum tree in the snow. The adjectives 'blue' and 'the silvery' refers to the 'light on snow' which illustrates the reflection of the tree on the snow. The personification '~~is~~ performing its ~~slow~~ slow miracle' shows the shadow is following every movement of the snow-gum tree. The poet is portraying the charm and beauty of the tree by capturing its reflection. Stewart emphasizes the beauty of nature and the miracles of Mother Nature. In the song "I Am Australian", Woodley and Newton express the beauty of nature and landscape of Australia. The ~~now~~ descriptive language of different elements, 'hot wind', 'dusty red soil' and 'black soil' shows the Australians appreciate nature. The nouns 'mountains and the valley' refers to the diverse landscape of Australia. The composers can see how Mother Nature has made Australia into a beautiful land. Thus, the composers <sup>have</sup> ~~successfully~~ successfully conveyed the Australian vision to the responders which the appreciation of nature and landscape.

Furthermore, the composers display an Australian vision by ~~emphasizing~~

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Australian values. In the poem "Lady Feeding the Cats", Stewart illustrates the Australian values by showing a woman who is old and poor feeding the stray cats. The nouns 'slums', 'stain' describe the lady as old and poor since she is wearing 'broken shoes' and 'weather stains'. The metaphor 'They think she is a princess out of a tower' refers to the way the cats feel because she is feeding them. The poet can see that the lady is poor but also a caring woman as she can still feed the cats despite her hardship.

The poet emphasizes the spirit of egalitarianism of showing compassion for those in need to the responders. In the song "I Am Australian", Woodley and Newton illustrates the Australian values by showing the unity of the Australian people. The repetition 'We are one' refers to the spirit of unity of the Australian people stand together for the support and love of their country. The inclusive language 'We share a dream' shows the equality of opportunity of each and every members of the Australian ~~society~~ society despite the difference in age or gender. The composers can see how the Australian people demonstrates the basis of free and democratic society for their country and thus they are proud of the peacefulness of Australia. Therefore, the Australian values which is also one of the Australian visions ~~to~~ have successfully conveyed <sup>to</sup> the responders.

In conclusion, Douglas Stewart shows the Australian visions by ~~not~~ portraying human connection with nature, the appreciation of nature and landscape, and Australian values in his poems while Bruce Woodley and Dobe Newton portray them in their song. By presenting these visions, the composers themselves want to  ~~not~~ show their admiration for the beauty and values of ~~the~~ the Australian nature and culture and want to share the splendour of ~~their~~ Australia with ~~their~~ responders.
