Source *E* is an extract from a letter by Charles Seymour a member of the US delegation at the Paris peace conference. The perspective that a US member of the delegation is quite useful in understanding Wilson's point of view on the treaty of Versailles and where he stood. Source ~~P~~ is an extract from a
book by David Lloyd George, which is
Britain's prime minister. It gives the perspective
of the British prime minister at the
time and what he thought was fair
and just ~~to be~~ reparations for ~~the~~ Germany.
The source is very biased in the sense that
Britain's own prime minister would hold his
own country in high regard and leave
out any indiscretions brought upon by him.
Very useful as it talks about the two
opposing ideas ~~that~~ of the three countries,
with Wilson & Lloyd George on the close
boundaries that the French faced with Germany.
And that Clemenceau wanted harsher penalties
that came from his extremist demanding
larger penalties for reparations from Germany
~~with both these sources~~ With both these sources
being biased it gives a one-sided
view of the talks at the Treaty of Versailles
peace talks, but that is ~~also~~ very useful to a
historian in finding out where the Allies stood.
